
Sex can feel great and can be really fun! Many people think sex is just about vaginal or anal intercourse... But, there are lots of different ways to have sex and lots of different types of sex. Sex can include kissing, touching, licking, tickling, sucking, and cuddling. Some people like to have aggressive sex, while others like to have soft and slow sex with their partners. There is no right or wrong way to have sex. Just have fun, explore and be yourself!



Some countries have laws that say people living with HIV must tell their sexual partner(s) about their status before having sex, even if they use condoms or only engage in sexual activity with a low risk of giving HIV to someone else. These laws violate the rights of people living with HIV by forcing them to disclose or face the possibility of criminal charges.







RFSU and Sida to contribute <u>SEK195 million for SRHR</u> advocacy

The Swedish Association for Sexuality Education (RFSU) and Sweden's development agency, Sida, have announced financial support for the AmplifyChange fund, which advocates for sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR), including for legal and safe abortion in South Asia and sub-Saharan Africa. In addition to safe abortions, the fund works for LGBT rights, sexual education, reproductive health, and to combat gender-based violence and stigmatization. The contribution totals SEK195 million (US\$23 million).



South Asia LGBT Network

Between 2007-2012 RFSU coordinated a Sida supported LGBT*network comprised of fifteen organisations from five different Asian
countries (*Bangladesh*, *India*, *Nepal*, *Pakistan* and *Sri Lanka*). The
network aimed to provide a strong and lasting group of organisations
that worked for LGBT-persons' health and rights in South Asia.






WHAT IS SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS (SRHR)?



SRHR basically mean the right to decide over one's own body, sexuality and reproduction. It is about the rights to have and express your sexuality and decide freely with whom you want to have sex irrespective of age gender or sexuality - as long as that decision does not infringe on any other person's rights. SRHR also include the elimination of harmful social practices and discrimination, such as child and forced marriage, sexual and gender-based violence and the social control of young peoples' and women's bodies and sexuality. Sexual and reproductive rights are based on internationally agreed human rights that countries must respect, protect and fulfill.





Violence, including gender-based violence: global estimates indicate that about 1 in 3 (35 per cent) women worldwide have experienced either physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence or non-partner violence in their lifetime. Violence is a violation of a person's rights and also puts women girls and already vulnerable populations at

- Students who are perceived not to conform to prevailing sexual and gender norms, including those who are lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender are more vulnerable to violence in schools. Violence based on sexual orientation and gender identity/expression, also referred to as homophobic and transphobic violence, is a form of schoolrelated gender-based violence (UNESCO, 2016b).
- Early and unintended pregnancy can also be the result of sexual violence from teachers and fellow students.
 Pregnancy-related GBV in schools includes bullying and teasing, perpetrated by classmates and teachers, towards pregnant girls and adolescent mothers (UNESCO, 2017).

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
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International technical guidance on sexuality education: An evidenceinformed approach

The international technical guidance on sexuality education was developed to assist education, health and other relevant authorities in the development and implementation of schoolbased and out-of-school comprehensive sexuality education programmes and materials.

It is immediately relevant for government education ministers and their professional staff, including curriculum developers, school principals and teachers. Non-governmental organizations, youth workers and young people can also use the document as an advocacy or accountability tool, for example by sharing it with decision-makers as a guide to lest practices and/or for its integration within broader agendas, such as the Sustainable Development Goals.

The Guidance is also useful for anyone involved in the design, delivery and evaluation of sexuality education programmes both in and out of school, including stakeholders working on quality education, sexual and reproductive health (SRH), adolescent health and/or gender equality, among other issues.

 Reviews of evidence should include holistic comprehensive evaluation, including formal and participatory, quantitative and qualitative processes, to shed light on contextual and implementation factors and implications. health outcomes.

 There is need to generate evidence to demonstrate the link between the demand creation potential of CSE and the provision of youth-friendly SRHR services and commodities.

Sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR)

Taken together, <u>SRHR</u> can be understood as the <u>right</u> for all, whether young or old, women, men or <u>transgender</u>, straight, gay, lesbian or bisexual, HIV positive or negative, to make choices regarding their own sexuality and reproduction, providing they respect the rights of others to bodily integrity. This definition also includes the right to access information and services needed to support these choices and optimize health.




It might not seem like a big deal, but terms such as "male or female" and "women or men" exclude non-binary and intersex people who don't fall into any of these categories. Diverse gender identities have always existed in every culture, and ensuring the rights of transgender, genderqueer, non-binary individuals and more—who often face horrifying violence and discrimination across the world—is an inherent part of gender equality. 




Everyday language plays a huge role in breaking gender stereotypes and rejecting the binary of "male and female". Instead of using phrases like "ladies and gentlemen" or "boys and girls", swap in a gender-neutral term like "folks," "children," or "y'all." These little changes can go a long way toward shifting cultural perceptions of gender.







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Twelve small actions with big impact for Generation Equality

Don't assume you know someone's pronoun or gender. One way to open up a conversation is to give your own: include your pronouns when you introduce yourself or add them to your email signature or your social media profiles. Gender pronouns include: she/her, he/him, they/them, ze/zir, ze/hir, xe/zem, and zie/hir, xe/xem, and ey/em.





